PRE-READING QUESTIONS

- Take at least 30 seconds to look carefully at all the details of the cover illustration, front and back. Don't read yet! What details do you notice immediately? What do you notice after looking more closely?
- 2. Can you find three different ways that stars are part of the cover? Make a prediction about how stars will be important to the story.
- 3. The three pigeons on the cover may seem surprising. Make a prediction about why they are important to the story.
- 4. Look closely at the boy's face (you might infer that this is Teddy). Choose at least 3 adjectives from the table below that you think describe him. You can also brainstorm your own adjective(s). For each one, write a detail you see as evidence. (One is done for you).

5. Read Teddy's Tips on the back cover of the book. What clues or questions does this list give you about Teddy's life?



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Reading Discussion Questions

- The book begins by introducing Teddy's brother Jake, and mentioning The Guiness Book of World Records. Make a prediction about how Jake and the Guinness Book will be important to the story.
- 2. Teddy's teacher, Ms. Raffeli says, "You'd think after having five of the Mars kids, they'd give me a break." (page 3) From what we know about Teddy so far, why do you think she would say this?
- 3. Viva is a new kid in Teddy's class. Why do you think the author, Molly B. Burnham, decided to include a new student in a story that's about Teddy?
- 4. On page 26, Viva says, "Your life is really different from mine. I'm an only child. Every single thing I do is watched, noticed, commented on, and discussed. It's like living under a microscope."

Compare and contrast Teddy's and Viva's families using the diagram below—or draw your own. Keep adding to it as you continue to read. An example is done to get you started.

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- 14. On pages 138-144, Teddy is trying to see his family's Christmas traditions through Vivia's eyes, since her family has joined his family for the first time.
 - **a.** What would you think about Teddy's family traditions compared to the ways your family celebrates holidays together?
 - b. Does your family have traditions that might seem unusual to someone who joined you for the first time, like Viva and her family? Write a short description of one of your family traditions from the perspective of a newcomer to your home.
- 15. On page 147, Teddy compares Mr. Marney to Lonesome George, the last tortoise of his species. Earlier in the book, he compared Mr. Marney to a cracker.
 - **a.** Think about these comparisons. Do Lonesome George and the cracker have anything in common?
 - b. How does Teddy feel about Mr. Marney?
 - c. Make a prediction about what might change about Mr.Marney and his pigeons.
- 16. The Mars family goes bowling to celebrate Teddy's dad's birthday in February (pages 161-162). Molly B. Burnham describes what happens from Teddy's point of view. Try rewriting the bowling alley scene from Jake's point of view. Think about what he wants, what's exciting and fun for him, and how he experiences the bowling alley.



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- 17. After the skunk incident, Teddy finally gets a record-breaking idea that relates to his own life, not just to records that are already in the book.
 - a. What is his idea?
 - **b.** Do you think he'll do it? Make a prediction based on what you know about Teddy and what you know about storytelling.
 - c. Do you think Jake will ruin this too?
- 18. On page 215, Teddy says: "Poor Destructor, he will never be normal. I guess it just doesn't run in our family. But maybe normal is not all it's cracked up to be."
 - a. Do you agree or disagree with Teddy's statement?
 - **b.** Has Teddy changed from the beginning of the book? How?
- 19. Look back at what you predicted about Teddy based on the cover illustration before reading the book. Now think about what you know about Teddy. How does the picture look now? Do the details mean something different to you after getting to know Teddy?
